NATIONAL

American Foundation for Suicide Prevention (AFSP) afsp.org

AFSP raises awareness, funds scientific research, and provides resources and aid to those affected by suicide. Chapters around the country also raise awareness 1) through programs called "Talk Saves Lives," 2) by marking International Survivors of Suicide Loss Day on November 23, and 3) through Out of the Darkness Walks. Rev. Cheryl Cloar, pastor of Winder First Christian Church, is chairing the Barrow County Walk on Sept. 28, 2019.

Mental Health First Aid Training www.mentalhealthfirstaid.org

Mental Health First Aid is an 8-hour course that gives people the skills to help someone who is developing a mental health problem or experiencing a mental health crisis. Evidence shows that training contributes to mental health literacy, helping individuals identify, understand, and respond to signs of mental illness. Rev. Tom Edmondson, pastor of First Christian Church of Atlanta, is a trained Mental Health First Aid instructor.

The DBHDD provides services and resources in the areas of mental health and substance abuse, developmental disabilities, and deaf services. Services are organized through six field offices that serve Georgia and administer the hospital and community resources assigned to that region. 
